





The Second Far South Coast (NSW) Sea Slug Census 6th-15th April, 2018

Thanks to everyone who participated in the 2nd Far South Coast Sea Slug Census.

The week-long census turned up quite a few interesting animals, however, one in particular stands out. The observation of *Goniobranchus albonares* is an important record. This tropical species has not been reported south of Sydney so far, and this is therefore an important range extension. Such observations reinforce how critical censuses are in far southern NSW for documenting species with shifting range. Whilst the animal in the photograph is clearly *G. albonares*, to illustrate the primary identification features , we have provided a close-up of a specimen found on the north coast where it is observed occasionally. The transparent rhinophore stalks, white-edged rhinophore lamellae and sub-marginal yellow band are characteristic of this species.

Altogether, a total of **32 species** of sea slug was found which is a record for the Far South Coast Census to date. Last census 31 species were found.

To help hone those identification skills, and to alert you all to some of the species you may have overlooked in the past, we have selected an image of each species found and provided the number of teams that found it, as number of sightings. 


